January 1

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 62
2. **Theme:** God our stronghold
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 62:1-2
4. **Statement:** This psalm calls God a stronghold. A stronghold is a castle—a strong-walled place of safety. Is God your castle?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, help me remember when I face trouble today to run into your arms and be safe.*

January 2

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 63
2. **Theme:** Satisfied in God
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 63:6-7
4. **Statement:** David wrote this when he was in grave difficulties. He feared for his life, yet was more concerned for his soul.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, when I am in danger or when people are lying about me, let me remember that You will eventually allow the truth to be seen.*

January 3

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 64
2. **Theme:** Prayer for deliverance
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 64:10
4. **Statement:** David is still in danger from secret enemies. Sometimes we have human enemies; more often we are our own worst enemy.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear God, deliver me from the devil and from myself. When I am vindicated, let me remember only You deserve the glory.*

January 4

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 65
2. **Theme:** Loving Creator
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 65:4
4. **Statement:** When David was downhearted, he looked at the wonders of the earth and remembered its powerful and loving Creator. Go outside today, and thank God for something you see.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Great Creator, I sing for joy with the rest of Your wonderful works.*

January 5

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 66
2. **Theme:** Praise for answered prayer
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 66:16
4. **Statement:** Another way David encouraged himself was to look to the history of God's work with His people. Have you ever felt that you were burdened or downtrodden or had gone through fire and water?
5. **Response:**

6. **Prayer:** *God, I thank You for the abundance of Your mercy. I thank You for the place of abundance You have brought me to, or that I trust You will bring me to.*

January 6

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 67
2. **Theme:** Let the nations praise God
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 67:7
4. **Statement:** This lovely song of praise calls for all the nations of the earth to bless their Maker and Guide. Can you think of three blessings God has given your nation?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear God, thank you for the ways you have blessed us. [Be specific.] Help me to remind my friends to give You praise.*

January 7

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 68
2. **Theme:** Prayer for marginalized people
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 68:19
4. **Statement:** This prayer shows God's care for those who live on the fringes of society—fatherless, widows, women, and captives. Do you ever feel marginalized? Or do you comfort those who are? God sees each of us, and God cares.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Father, thank you for daily bearing my burden, and for being my salvation.*

January 8

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 69
2. **Theme:** Cry of distress
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 69:34
4. **Statement:** This psalm shows two things clearly: David knows he is at least partly to blame for his present desperation (v. 5, 19, etc.), and he knows he can express even his most negative feelings to God. Jesus teaches us not to hate our enemies, but if we bring our true feelings to God, He will help us to heal them. You will note that David ends with praise.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O Lord, when I hate my enemies, "answer me with Your saving truth, deliver me from the mire and do not let me sink!" Remind me to praise.*

January 9

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 70
2. **Theme:** Prayer for help
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 70:4
4. **Statement:** Again, a song of despair turns into praise. Have you ever tried praising God anyway, even when you are in great trouble?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear Lord, I know that You are my help and my deliverer, and that You do not delay even when it seems long to me. Help me trust You.*

January 10

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 71
2. **Theme:** My God from cradle to grave
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 71:5-6
4. **Statement:** This is a long song of praise for past guidance and deliverance, and prayer for future care. Consider your own life. How have you been “sustained from birth?” How are you being taught in your youth?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O Lord, I give myself to You and trust Your care until I am old and gray, and until the moment of my death. Or until Your coming!*

January 11

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 72
2. **Theme:** Prayer for governments
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 72:2 [Put your leader’s name in place of “he”.]
4. **Statement:** This psalm is both a prayer for King Solomon and a Messianic vision for the future. Use it as a form to pray for your government.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *King of all kings, I know that You have final say over earthly governments, even when they do not rule as You would have them do. Hurry and come set up Your perfect government!*

January 12

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 73
2. **Theme:** Does evil prosper?
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 73:25
4. **Statement:** Asaph was a great songwriter, assigned by David in 1 Chron. 6:39. Here, he tells the story of almost losing faith from seeing evil seem to prosper. In verse 13-14 he nearly loses hope. What makes the change? (See v. 17.)
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God of all things, keep my eyes open toward Your sanctuary and Your power and compassion. I know “I am continually with You and You hold my hand.” Thank You!*

January 13

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 74
2. **Theme:** Has God abandoned us?
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 74:12
4. **Statement:** Asaph is still filled with questions about the injustice he sees. His psalm is applicable in almost infinite times and places. Do you have some of his questions? Pray especially over the verses that most call to your heart.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God, I trust You. I trust You. I trust You! I know you will never abandon us!*

January 14

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 75
2. **Theme:** The righteous Judge
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 75:6-7
4. **Statement:** Here, Asaph reminds himself of who the truly righteous Judge is. He leaves the timing to God. Is it always easy to do that?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Father, I will rejoice forever in You, whether I see justice or not. Keep me true to you.*

January 15

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 76
2. **Theme:** God saves the humble
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 76:8-9
4. **Statement:** Asaph now praises the glorious and excellent God who is the judge of all the earth. In verse 11 he reminds us to pay our vows to God. Do you owe a vow to God?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Mighty God, I owe You all my love and praise and obedience, forever and ever, Amen.*

January 16

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 77
2. **Theme:** Songs in the night
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 77:6
4. **Statement:** Asaph must have written these psalms during times of trouble in his own life, and perhaps in the life of his people. But when he was so worried he couldn't sleep at night, it was always God he turned to. What do you do when you can't sleep?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Shepherd God, no matter what happens, I can sleep in peace in Your hands, knowing You are in charge and will ultimately prevail.*

January 17

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 78
2. **Theme:** History of God's dealings
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 78:6
4. **Statement:** In this long psalm, Asaph remembers all the ways the people dishonored God, and all God's mercy and forgiveness. He is glad God chose David to shepherd them. Is there a leader in your life that is a good shepherd under God, like David? Have you thanked this person?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God, I thank You for Your godly leaders [be specific] and I will help and support them.*

January 18

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 79
2. **Theme:** Prayer for rescue and mercy
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 79:13
4. **Statement:** Asaph sees the enemies of God and of God's people, but he also sees (verse 8) the people's guilt. He begs for God's mercy. Spend some time on the final verse.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *My beloved Good Shepherd, I am Your lamb, and I will give You praise forever and show Your goodness to others.*

January 19

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 80
2. **Theme:** The Good Shepherd
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 80:18-19
4. **Statement:** Here Asaph again writes his best poetry in praise and gratitude of the leading of God, the Good Shepherd. He knows the people do not deserve God's mercy, but he begs for it anyway.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God of my salvation, restore me where I need restoration, and help me to be an obedient lamb.*

January 20

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 81
2. **Theme:** Song for a new month
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 81:16
4. **Statement:** This appears to be a song of praise to be sung on New Moon festivals (the beginning of months). It praises God and also admonishes the people to be faithful.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O Lord, are there ways in which I have been idolatrous, putting something else before You? Show me, and cleanse me. I would be only Yours!*

January 21

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 82
2. **Theme:** God rebukes unjust judges
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 82:8
4. **Statement:** When have you seen unjust judgments (officially or unofficially) in your community or state? Which groups does this psalm list as those God expects justice, rescue, and deliverance for? How can you help?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Righteous Judge, it is beyond astonishing that You are eager to judge in our favor! Help me to live inside Jesus' righteousness and to live from that space of love and inclusion.*

January 22

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 83
2. **Theme:** Prayer for deliverance
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 83:1
4. **Statement:** Asaph could, in this psalm, be still considering the injustice in his last psalm. As he considers arrogance, oppression, and conspiracy against the innocent, he becomes angry. Sometimes God's judgment must be a negative one, though He always sorrows over those lost ones.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O Lord, help me find ways to reach out to those who further injustices. Is there a way I can reach even them, bringing them to Your love and mercy for them, so they can share that with others?*

January 23

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 84
2. **Theme:** Prayer for deliverance
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 84:5
4. **Statement:** This is one of the most touching of psalms, evoking an image of a bird nesting in the eaves of God's temple. Is this how you think of God's house? Are there other places that could be called the dwelling place of God? Which are your favorite?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O Lord of hosts, I love to be at Your house. Even more than that, I ask You to make me a humble dwelling place for You!*

January 24

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 85
2. **Theme:** Prayer for complete restoration
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 84:10
4. **Statement:** This psalm was written after a calamity and then a reversal of calamity. God's people have been delivered, and the psalmist is asking God to complete their restoration, and also begging the people to be faithful this time. Think about a time when this might be said of you.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God, You have delivered me so many times from my own foolishness! Thank You so much, and please help me to stay far from folly and to walk in Your way.*

January 25

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 86
2. **Theme:** Prayer for wholeness
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 86:4
4. **Statement:** Here is another of David's psalms. He asks for God's blessing, calling himself godly (verse 2) without denying his sinfulness (verse 5). Verse 11 is especially intriguing: "Unite my heart to fear your name." Is your heart divided and in need of unity?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear Father, please pull together the broken pieces of my heart. Bind them all to long for one thing only—You!*

January 26

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 87
2. **Theme:** The city of God
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 87:3
4. **Statement:** Songs have been written based on this psalm. Sing one, if you know any. Does the psalm really mean that it is more blessed to be born in any particular *physical* place? What else might it mean?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Great Creator, I am born again daily in the true "city of God"—in Your heart and Your love. Keep me safe there, I pray.*

January 27

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 88
2. **Theme:** Prayer for deliverance
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 88:13
4. **Statement:** Heman the Ezrahite is in dire straits. He is near death, either from physical illness or emotional distress; likely both. This psalm ends on his pain and despair, longing for God's help. (Wait for tomorrow's reading.) Have you ever felt this despairing?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *My God, My God, sometimes I do feel forsaken. Help me to trust You always, always! Even when I don't yet see light...*

January 28

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 89
2. **Theme:** Hope in God's faithfulness
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 89:1
4. **Statement:** Now we hear the rest of Heman's song. He can turn to hope and trust no matter how he feels. He goes through a long list of God's acts of faithfulness, and then admits that God's people have not been deserving of this grace. But Heman ends in praise.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, help me always to begin and end with praise, no matter what. You are the Most High. My life is in Your hands.*

January 29

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 90
2. **Theme:** Song of Moses
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 90:1-2
4. **Statement:** One of the most famous psalms, this one is credited to Moses. Imagine him, an old man (though apparently not as old as he will be! See verse 10) looking back on a varied and adventurous life and giving God glory. What does he ask?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, You have been my dwelling place, even before I knew You. Make me Yours indeed, Yours forever. Let all I do glorify You.*

January 30

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 91
2. **Theme:** Prayer for deliverance
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 91:11
4. **Statement:** Here is another famous psalm, perhaps one you have memorized at some point. Which is your favorite part? Pray slowly through this whole psalm, personalizing each passage; for example, referring to a particular "pestilence" that has troubled you. Hear God responding with the last verses, directly to you.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Almighty, I can only thank You and thank You!*

January 31

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 92
2. **Theme:** Praise for God's goodness
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 92:4
4. **Statement:** Put a star or marker of some kind on this psalm in your Bible. It is the only one specifically labeled as being for the Sabbath. Try reading it on Sabbaths for a while. And when you next look at a palm, cedar, or fruit tree, think of the words of this psalm.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Father God, thank You for making me flourish, for keeping my "leaves" green and full of sap. Lead me to a great and faithful old age.*

February 1

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 93
2. **Theme:** God's majesty and power
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 93:1-2
4. **Statement:** This is a good psalm to read during floods or monsoons, or even at a beach on any day. What kinds of circumstantial or emotional "floods" have lifted their voices in your life and tried to drown out God?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Great God, You are mightier than any storm or flood or wave. Help me to remember that in the midst of turmoil, and to trust You.*

February 2

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 94
2. **Theme:** God of justice
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 94:17-19
4. **Statement:** Once again, widows, orphans, and alien refugees are subjects of God's special care. This psalm expresses anger and dismay, but as always, comes back to peace and trust.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O God, when anxious thoughts multiply within me, remind me of Your consolations that can delight my soul.*

February 3

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 95
2. **Theme:** Our Rock and our Shepherd
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 95:7
4. **Statement:** In this psalm of praise, God is our Rock and also our loving Shepherd. Give more thought to what it means to be "sheep of His pasture." How are you a sheep? What pasture does God have you in right now?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Great Shepherd of my soul, I will stay by Your side and not stray. I will not harden my heart or test You. I am Your little lamb.*

February 4

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 96
2. **Theme:** Call to worship
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 96:7-8
4. **Statement:** Here is another song of praise that has been set to music many times. Which are your favorite praises? If you don't know music to this psalm, try putting it, or part of it, to a tune yourself.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God of splendor and majesty, strength and beauty, I do ascribe holiness to You. I proclaim good tidings and tell of Your works.*

February 5

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 97
2. **Theme:** God over all
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 97:9
4. **Statement:** There is idolatry everywhere in this world. In some places it is more obvious. Do you live where some people worship images? How can you help them to see that the praises in this psalm can only apply to the Most High God without making them feel judged and defensive?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Only true God, give me words and acts that will show Your praise and make people see that You are SO much more sufficient than the idols, whether tangible or not, they have been taught to lean on!*

February 6

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 98
2. **Theme:** Sing a new song
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 98:1
4. **Statement:** This could be seen as a song for the New Earth. In it, the psalmist envisions a world where all have "seen salvation." Even nature joins in the praise, seas and rivers and mountains joining in.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Maker of all, keep my heart set on Your victory, already certain from the foundation of the world, even if it isn't visible to human eyes yet. Help me bring that day!*

February 7

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 99
2. **Theme:** Exalting God
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 99:9
4. **Statement:** Most of the rest of the psalms are all praise psalms. These are the most joyful ones to read and spend time with. This one looks back at God's history with Israel. Which parts of it apply to you personally?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, even when I have been unfaithful to You, You have always been faithful to me. I thank You and praise You!*

February 8

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 100
2. **Theme:** The doxology (word of glory)
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 100:1
4. **Statement:** "Old 100," as it is often known, has been one of the most beloved of psalms for centuries. Many doxologies are based on the words of this psalm. How many do you know? Sing one if you can.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, You are God; I serve You with gladness and I come before You with singing!*

February 9

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 101
2. **Theme:** A choice to follow
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 101:3
4. **Statement:** It is God who works in us to do right, but He does need our choice. We, like David, can determine in advance what we will do. Then, even if we stumble, we can always get back on the path.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, I choose to walk in integrity and turn away from lies and slander. [Personalize verses you know God wants to make true in your life.]*

February 10

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 102
2. **Theme:** Prayer for mercy
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 102:12
4. **Statement:** Here again is someone who is either very ill or in great emotional distress—likely both. He expresses all his difficulties, then turns immediately to faith, before he sees God answer. Then...look at verse 18. That's you and me! He wrote it down so that we might praise the Lord!
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear God, I promise to learn to praise You even while I am in distress and waiting for Your answer. I will state in faith that the appointed time has come, even before I see it.*

February 11

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 103
2. **Theme:** Bless the Lord!
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 103:11-12
4. **Statement:** Bless the Lord, O my soul! This psalm is a long list of all the reasons why. Add your own to the list.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, my soul and all that is within me blesses Your holy name! You have thrown my sins as far as the east is from the west, and had compassion on me like a loving father. I love You!*

February 12

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 104
2. **Theme:** Rejoicing in creation
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 104:24
4. **Statement:** This is a particularly fascinating psalm. Verses 2-4 seem to tell the story of the creation of the heavens and angels that were already made before the story begins in Genesis 1. Verses 5-9 could apply to the Great Flood, but they could also apply to covering the earth with water before shaping it for habitation. The rest of the psalm celebrates creation.

6. **Prayer:** *Great Creator, You care for all the earth, and You care for me.*

February 13

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 105
2. **Theme:** Looking back
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 105:4
4. **Statement:** This psalm retells the great stories of God's work with Israel. Using what you know of the Exodus, ponder which stories the psalmist refers to and which he leaves out of this telling and why he might have done so.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *God, I know You have been leading in my own life to this day, too. Help me to be faithful to Your leading.*

February 14

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 106
2. **Theme:** Our rebellion; God's faithfulness
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 106:48
4. **Statement:** This is Part 2 of the last psalm. It still begins and ends with praise, but the main burden of the psalm is much sadder; it tells the story of the people's general response to God's leading—rebellion. Read prayerfully and determine if there are stories in your past which follow this model. If not, thank God, if so, please do repent.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Rock of Israel, I do want to follow You. I am sorry for any time I have rebelled [be specific] and I ask for your forgiveness. Glory to Your name!*

February 15

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 107
2. **Theme:** Ever-present God
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 107:2
4. **Statement:** This psalm is a favorite for seafarers of all kinds because of verses 23-32, but in fact, it lists a variety of people who have been in trouble and despair, and whom God has walked with in their pain. Make a list of those mentioned. Which is most like your own trials and difficulties? How has God delivered you?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *O great God of lovingkindness, thank You for Your mercies to me and mine! Stay with me always, and keep me patient and trusting as I wait, sometimes, for your deliverance to be complete.*

February 16

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 108
2. **Theme:** Praise in difficulties
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 108:1
4. **Statement:** David apparently feels rejected, but you wouldn't know it until the last few verses. He is spending all his energy reminding himself of how great God is. How can you keep your heart steadfast and full of praise even when all seems dark?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Keep my heart steadfast, O Lord! When I am in darkness, may my praises, even with tearful eyes, wake the dawn!*

February 17

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 109
2. **Theme:** Surrounded by enemies
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 109:4
4. **Statement:** Once again David expresses his anger and fear to God. His anger extends to a sinful desire for God to avenge even the innocent children of his enemies. But God's mercy to him is clear as David begs for God's grace.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Lord, when I am angry, keep me from sinning with my lips, but also keep me honest before You. When I am afflicted and needy, deliver me.*

February 18

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 110
2. **Theme:** A call to youth
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 110:3
4. **Statement:** Jesus quotes this psalm, pointing out that David called the future Messiah "Lord." It promises that God's people will "volunteer freely" and that His youth are like the morning dew, bringing refreshment to the earth. How do *you* volunteer for God?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Great Messiah, I want to work for You. I want to bring the refreshing water of life to thirsty souls. Lead me in the way You want me to go.*

February 19

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 111
2. **Theme:** Praise for God's works
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 111:10
4. **Statement:** The psalmist is overwhelmed as he contemplates the power and works of God. Yet God's grace and compassion are never overcome by His majesty and righteousness.
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Dear God, thank You for Your love and compassion. Remind me daily to pay attention to Your mighty works.*

February 20

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 112
2. **Theme:** True prosperity
3. **Study Verse:** Psalm 112:4
4. **Statement:** This psalm speaks of wealth and earthly prosperity for those who follow God. Sometimes this is not a visible fact here on earth. What kinds of prosperity does God promise to *all* who are faithful?
5. **Response:** _____

6. **Prayer:** *Creator and King, I am grateful when You bless me with earthly prosperity in response to my faithfulness. But more than that I am grateful for richness of generosity and spirit. I can wait until heaven for physical riches.*

February 21

1. **Chapter:** Psalm 113
2. **Theme:** God exalts the humble
