- 2. Theme: A new Sanctuary
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 11:19-20
- 4. Statement: The prophet sees the evil leaders of Jerusalem, and God's judgment against them and is terrified. Will the land be completely gone? God responds with reassurance that *He* is their sanctuary no matter where they go, and makes one of the most beautiful promises in the Bible. Where does God truly dwell?

- 6. **Prayer:** *Living Lord, make my heart your temple. Write Your law of love in me and live in me forever.*

October 2

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 12
- 2. Theme: God's word immovable
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 12:28
- 4. **Statement:** Ezekiel, already in exile with others, acts out a living parable showing that the ones still in Jerusalem will also go into exile. When people claim that his vision, even if true, is for far in the future, God is clear that it is not. Can we apply this to Jesus' second coming? What are its limitations?

- 6. **Prayer:** God, I do want You to come now and not delay, but I don't want to set times or think I know more than I do. Help me to simply live as if it were today.

October 3

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 13
- 2. Theme: False male and female prophets
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 13:2
- 4. **Statement:** Some people were not only seeing (or making up) false visions, but they were also apparently selling "magic" charms for people to carry. The Bible shows God's anger most clearly when it is against evil done in His own name. Have you seen that done?

- 6. **Prayer:** Dear God, every day in our world, people do evil and call it good. Far too often, they claim You want them to do it. Fulfill what You promised in this chapter make it clear You are the only God.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 14
- 2. Theme: God's purpose will be fulfilled
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 14:22
- 4. **Statement:** This chapter, interestingly, does not talk of wooden or metal idols, but of idols "set up in their hearts." What do you think that means? How do you feel when you read of the eventual healing God promises?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Dear Lord, search my heart. If there are any thoughts, feelings, opinions, desires, or ANYTHING that comes before You, take it away! Make my "conduct and actions" be of comfort to those who have taught me.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 15
- 2. **Theme:** The useless vine
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 15:8
- 4. **Statement:** If you were a carpenter, looking for wood to build something with, what kind of wood would you seek? God says Jerusalem and her people have been weak, clinging, and worthless, rather than standing strong against the storms of life like the trees they were intended to be like. Are you a vine, or a tree?

- 6. **Prayer:** Great Gardener, grow me into the "tree planted by rivers of water" that You have planned for me. Make me strong and useful.

October 6

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 16
- 2. Theme: The story of God's bride
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 16:14
- 4. **Statement:** This is an amazing and vivid story. Make a list of all the things God gave His bride. In some ways, this is a literal list. God did give Israel great temporal wealth and blessing. Note what the bride (His people) used those blessings for. If you were a loving spouse, what would you do if your mate took all the things you gave him/her and gave them to other lovers?

 - 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 17
 - 2. Theme: Planting stories
 - 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 17:24
 - 4. **Statement:** Nebuchadnezzar and the Pharaoh are the two eagles, but God is the mover behind the events. He has commanded submission to Nebuchadnezzar, not Pharaoh, and in the end, it is *His* planting which will endure. How can we apply this parable to our lives today?
 - 5. Response: _____
 - 6. **Prayer:** *My* God, You are my only King. I will stay where You put me and bloom where I am planted, or I will move out to new and unknown lands—as You dictate.

October 8

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 18
- 2. Theme: Each one's life judged individually
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 18:31
- 4. Statement: This is a chapter to which we still come back today. Some think the third commandment (Ex. 20:5-6) in which God describes consequences, as being *His* choice to punish descendants. Here He sets the record clear. Each stands before God alone. Lest we think this is all judged on works, He clarifies further in v 31—what is needed is a new *heart*—which He has already promised.

6. **Prayer:** Great Maker, You have treated Your people as a loving husband would. And we have played You false so many times! Please forgive and heal us! 6. **Prayer:** Dear Lord, give me that new heart! Let me stand for right no matter what family or friends may do, and seek to turn others back from wickedness if You ask me to.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 19
- 2. Theme: God's tears
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 19:10
- 4. **Statement:** Again we are shown God weeping for the people into which He has poured so much love and care and training. He planted them in a good and fertile land where they had all they needed, He gave them water (especially important in an arid land)...and how did they respond?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Father, if I ever make You cry, I am sorry! Teach me to make You joyful instead.

October 10

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 20
- 2. Theme: God remembers
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 20:12, 20
- 4. **Statement:** Elders among the exiles come to Ezekiel, claiming to inquire of the Lord. God reminds them of His leading for hundreds of years past. Do they *really* want to inquire of Him now? Unlikely. What does God say the true purpose of the Sabbath is? Why does He repeat it twice? Do you think we clearly understand this today, or have we turned it into a burden?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord of the Sabbath, thank You for this great gift! Help me to use it as a weekly reminder that only You are God, and only You can save!

October 11

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 21
- 2. Theme: God groans and weeps
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 21:6
- 4. **Statement:** God has determined that judgment is necessary, but He hates it. If only His children would have listened to Him! He has given chance after chance after chance, even after the first attacks of Babylon and the first taking of captives. But they *will not*. The same thing happens when Jesus comes, several centuries later. (See Matt. 23:37.)
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, I weep with You when I see the people of this world running this way and that, every way except the way You have given for our health and happiness. Is there something I can do to turn just one?

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 22
- 2. Theme: The sins of the people
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 22:30
- 4. **Statement:** This is a difficult chapter to read. The list of the people's defiant sins goes on and on; at the head of the list are bloodshed, idolatry, and immorality. God says He couldn't find even one righteous person to "stand in the gap." What do you think that means?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, You promise that the prayer of one righteous person can accomplish much. Let me stand in the gap for You. May my prayers turn someone back from ruin.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 23
- 2. **Theme:** Two sinful sisters
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 23:4
- 4. **Statement:** This chapter is even more difficult to read. God tells the story of Israel (the northern kingdom) and Judah (the southern kingdom), using the imagery of two lewd and promiscuous sisters. Nothing else God has said or done has made the slightest impression. Perhaps these shocking images will rouse them to realize the horrific nature of their defiance against God.

- 6. **Prayer:** Dear God, I am so sorry that so many of the people You have created continue to turn against You with all their hearts. Please never let me be like that in the smallest way!

October 14

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 24
- 2. Theme: The most painful living parable
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 24:18
- 4. Statement: Of all the things God asks his prophets to do for Him, this must have been one of the most difficult. God tells Ezekiel that his wife will die, but he must use her death as another parable for the people. He is not to mourn, just as the people will not be able to mourn their relatives now that Jerusalem is under siege. Try to imagine Ezekiel's pain.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** O Lord, I would love to be there when Ezekiel meets his wife again in Your kingdom. I would love to hear You tell him, "Well done, good and faithful servant," for following no matter how difficult, in the struggle to turn even a few hearts back to You.

October 15

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 25
- 2. Theme: Judgment on Gentile nations
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 25:5
- 4. **Statement:** The nations around Judah laughed and cheered and mocked when Judah fell. But they, too, were descended from those who knew God, and had no excuse. Now they will meet the consequences.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Father, when I see others face painful consequences from their own wrong choices, let me not ever gloat over them.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 26
- 2. Theme: Tyre destroyed
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 26:13-14
- 4. **Statement:** Tyre, too, mocked and jeered at Judah's destruction. It was destroyed and has never been rebuilt. Once again, some of this sounds similar to the final judgments against the whole satanic system of following one's own desires instead of seeking God and the values of love and compassion.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Great King, let us find comfort in the fact that, after all this destruction, even after the final destruction of earth, You still promise "glory in the land of the living." (Verse 20)

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 27
- 2. Theme: God weeps over Tyre
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 27:1-3
- 4. **Statement:** Even the most evil of sinners were once created by God to be glorious and loving children of the King. Even over Tyre, God weeps. This chapter shows the beauty that was there. How might the story have ended differently if all those gifts had been used for good instead of evil?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Father, You yearn over us—every single one of us. I will follow You. I grieve for those who refuse.

October 18

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 28
- 2. Theme: Tyre and Lucifer
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 28:14
- 4. **Statement:** Tyre is often the representative of Lucifer, who was created beautiful, glorious, and gifted in ways we can only imagine, but who said, "I am a god." The paradox at the heart of this chapter is that in trying to make his "heart like the heart of God," Lucifer only made himself the very opposite of God's real heart. He didn't want God's *heart*—he only wanted His *power*.

- 6. **Prayer:** O God, how painful it must have been for You to lose all those angels You had created, and loved so much! I want only to be Your humble child—I don't want to be You!

October 19

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 29
- 2. Theme: Judgment against Egypt
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 29:21
- 4. Statement: Egypt has come in for God's retribution before. Israel and Judah thought Egypt could defend them against Babylon, but it couldn't even defend itself. Interestingly, in vs 14-16 God promises restoration to a remnant of Egypt, as He has to a remnant of Israel.
- 5. **Response:**_____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord God most high, You sit above all the nations of earth. We are like children making cities in a sandbox, compared to You. Let us remember to be humble.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 30
- 2. Theme: God weeps over Egypt
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 30:13
- 4. **Statement:** If anyone thinks (as Israel did, and still will in a few centuries when Jesus comes the first time) that God loves Israel more than other nations, all they need to do is read these laments God gives over the Gentile nations He has to judge. He hates all this violence and bloodshed. But sometimes it's the only thing some people will hear. Why do you think that is?

- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, never let me forget that You love ALL the peoples of earth, and always weep at the loss of any of them!

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 31
- 2. Theme: God calls even to Pharaoh
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 31:3
- 4. Statement: God even sends a prophecy to Pharaoh himself, reminding him of the fate of Assyria, which set itself up as greater and better than anyone else. Egypt, too, will fall if Pharaoh does not humble himself before the only Creator.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Father, You never play favorites. You call us all, You long for us all, and You judge us all when we are defiant—only so that You might save some, at least.

October 22

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 32
- 2. Theme: God weeps over all His lost ones
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 32:16
- 4. **Statement:** This begins with God's lament over Egypt and Pharaoh, but later includes all the other defiant nations that have gone before. There have been many, many since. What will it take for people to turn to God?
- 5. Response: _____

6. **Prayer:** Creator of all, You will one day be comforted it, when it is all over and all who remain are faithful and the universe runs on love alone. I long for that day.

October 23

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 33
- 2. Theme: Duties of a watcher
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 33:7
- 4. Statement: Over the millennia, God has called many men and women to stand on the walls as watchers for Him, to blow the trumpet and call the people to repentance. There are two ways to go wrong: to not pass on the warning when God gives it to you, or to presume to speak for God when He *did not* give you the message. How can we be certain to speak only when and what God wants us to speak?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, I want to be one of Your faithful workers. I don't want to fail to give warning when You ask me to, nor do I want to go overboard and preach at people for whom You have not given me a message. Please keep me clear on what You want me personally to do and say.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 34
- 2. Theme: Judging the shepherds
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 34:12
- 4. Statement: The ones who come in for the harshest judgments of God are those who were given the watchcare over God's flocks and instead, used the people for their own gain. God rebukes those faithless shepherds and promises to come Himself and find his wandering ones.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Great Shepherd, it's comforting to be reminded that throughout all this judgment, rebuke, and destruction, there were always individuals and groups who were faithful to You, and for whom You faithfully cared.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 35
- 2. Theme: Judgment against Edom
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 35:11
- 4. **Statement:** Edom delivered Israel to her enemies, hoping to pick up the pieces and gain some wealth and land out of the deal. Note that God says He will deal with them according to their own anger and envy. If we are humble and teachable, then when we make mistakes, how does God deal with us?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, even if I fail, I hope I will always do so out of the best of intentions, and I always promise to listen to Your corrections, so You don't have to deal with me according to anger or envy.

October 26

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 36
- 2. Theme: Restoration and healing
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 36:8-9
- 4. **Statement:** Finally! It's been a while, this time, since God interjected the promises of healing and restoration in between the prophecies of doom and punishment. But his mercy never, ever runs out, and all this time, if only the nations had turned and repented, they still could have changed the story. How sad that they did not, and how wonderful that God still promises restoration.

- 6. **Prayer:** Redeemer, You have redeemed us, and You will redeem us. Thank You so much!

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 37
- 2. Theme: Dry Bone Valley
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 37:27
- 4. **Statement:** This is one of the favorites among Ezekiel's visions. Take some time to try to imagine this whole story, from the frightening view of a valley full of skeletons, to their revival, rebuilding, and the final, messianic kingdom. The end verses will only be fully fulfilled after Jesus comes again. Which things must we wait for and which things can be true in our lives now?

- 6. **Prayer:** Father, let Your dwelling place be with me now! Let me be one of Your sanctified people—forever.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 38
- 2. Theme: Gog and Magog and the final battle
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 38:23
- 4. Statement: This is clearly a prophecy for the last days. Make a list of all the things that tell you this is true. Here are three to start you off: so many countries named in vs 3-6, and the "remote parts of the north"; v 8: "after many days...in the latter years..."; v 16: "in the last days." How many more can you find?

- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, I don't look forward to the final battles, but I do trust You to get Your faithful ones through them, and I DO long for the days after it's all over!

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 39
- 2. Theme: Gog, continued
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 39:7-8
- 4. Statement: Here are more clues that this is speaking of the last "great and terrible day of the Lord." Compare v 17 with Luke 17:37. Some of these prophecies were meant for Israel and Judah of that day; some would have come true if Israel had taken up her appointed task of being a light to the world, and some are still to be fulfilled for "spiritual Israel," of which all faithful believers are now a part.

- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, You are my God, and I will watch for Your promised complete restoration.

October 30

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 40
- 2. Theme: Man with a measuring rod
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 40:4
- 4. **Statement:** It's important to note that this man Ezekiel sees is not measuring the literal Jerusalem temple—that's burned down by this time. V 2 shows "a very high mountain" on which is "a structure like a city," and it is this which is measured—in exhaustive detail. What do you think God is trying to teach here?

- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, You are measuring and discerning every detail of every life on earth. Keep mine in Christ's, so that I am measured with His perfection.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 41
- 2. Theme: More measuring
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 41:4
- 4. **Statement:** This chapter goes inside the temple. Do you think all this detail is, at least in part, about the careful examination by God of every detail of our hearts, which are to be the dwelling place for God? (See 1 Cor. 6:19-20 and Heb. 10:20.)

- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, You can measure my heart. Every single bit of me is open to You, and You can do all that You please to make me as You wish me to be.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 42
- 2. Theme: Still measuring
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 42:13
- 4. Statement: The man is still measuring every detail. Apparently, it's quite a big job. It's interesting that now and then, such as in vs 13-14, he feels the need to repeat temple instructions, as if they have been lost over the centuries. What are some things humans have lost sight of, concerning holiness?

6. **Prayer:** Great God, You are the only One who is qualified to measure. Remind me of that when I am tempted to judge others—or even myself.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 43
- 2. Theme: God fills the temple
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 43:7
- 4. **Statement:** Finally, we learn the goal of all this careful measuring—the glory of God is coming into His temple, and He will fill the house with light. What are some clues that this is speaking of the final and complete restoration of the earth to God?

^{6.} **Prayer:** *O* great High Priest, You have measured us and found us far short of Your ideal, but You have come to fill and rebuild us to the full stature You dream of. Help me live in that truth.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 44
- 2. Theme: Redefining the covenant
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 44:24
- 4. **Statement:** Here, God goes over all the laws He gave centuries before. Why do you think He needs to do that at this time, with Jerusalem in ruins and most of His people in exile far from home? If you were one of them, how would you respond to this?
- 5. Response: _____

6. **Prayer:** Dear Lord, I take comfort in Your repetition of Your ways when all seems to be in rubble around me.

November 4

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 45
- 2. **Theme:** Renewing the sacrificial system, part 1
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 45:9
- 4. **Statement:** Now God goes over the feast days and sacrifices, as He gave them originally to Moses and to a people who had just been released from slavery and oppression. Do you think there is any significance in the comparison of the people then and the people now in exile?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** God of all times and all places, You are holy and to be worshiped. In imitation of Jesus, I give You the sacrifice of myself and my heart.

November 5

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 46
- 2. **Theme:** Renewing the sacrificial system, part 2
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 46:3
- 4. **Statement:** God continues His re-teaching of the old feasts and festivals, with special emphasis on Sabbath and New Moon (beginning of month) festivals. How can we, today, honor these ancient celebrations given by God?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Lord, thank You so much for the sacrifice of Your Son, once for all time and all people. Help us to still honor You in our spring-times and harvests and in the passing of our days, months, and years.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 47
- 2. Theme: Water of life
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 47:12
- 4. **Statement:** Once again it becomes clear that this prophecy has an end-times layer to it. The water from the temple is like the water from God's throne in Rev. 22:1-2, and the trees on its banks are like the tree of life in that same passage. Do you think there are also symbolic meanings for today? If so, what are they?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Jesus, You promised the water of life, in the form of the Holy Spirit to every believer, and eventually, access to the Tree of Life as well. Let me learn to live in that reality now.

- 1. Chapter: Ezekiel 48
- 2. Theme: Dividing up the city
- 3. Study Verse: Ezekiel 48:35
- 4. **Statement:** In a fitting end for this prophetic book, the main point of this chapter seems to be, there's room for everybody! No one is left out. Again, the description reminds one of the New Jerusalem, and certainly its permanent name, "The Lord Is There," cannot be applied to any earthly city. Try to imagine life in the New Jerusalem.

- 6. **Prayer:** *Emmanuel, I long to learn to be aware in every single minute that You are here with me.*

November 8

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 1
- 2. Theme: Daniel's choice
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 1:8
- 4. **Statement:** Daniel and his friends were among those carried away after the first attack of Babylon. Nebuchadnezzar had the positive policy of treating defeated nobles with honor, and his officials were being generous to offer these young men the king's own food. Notice how respectful Daniel was as he expressed his opposing wishes.

- 6. **Prayer:** Dear Lord, in a way, all of us live in enemy territory. Help us to be compassionate and respectful as we share our differing views, rather than accusing and judgmental.

November 9

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 2
- 2. Theme: Nebuchadnezzar's dream
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 2:22
- 4. **Statement:** Here is one of the greatest prophetic passages in the whole Bible. Notice how Daniel, already beginning to be honored, refers all glory back to God, not himself. His first impulse, in danger, was to pray. What is your first impulse in danger?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Father, let me always turn to You, every single day, so that I will automatically do so when I am afraid.

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 3
- 2. **Theme:** The golden image
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 3:17-18
- 4. **Statement:** Do you remember what metal the first part of the image in the king's dream was? What is he saying by raising a giant statue made entirely of gold? When did the three men make their choice? Was it now, in the heat of the moment?
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** *My* God, *I* am Yours. *I* am Yours now, today. That way, when danger threatens, the choice is already made.

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 4
- 2. Theme: Nebuchadnezzar's story
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 4:37
- 4. **Statement:** This is the only chapter in the Bible that we know was written by a pagan king. He has already learned something of the power of God through the witness of the four young men. In this story, which takes place over several years, the lesson is firmly cemented. We learn nothing more about Nebuchadnezzar; the next chapter is later. I hope he stuck by his decision to honor God.

- 6. **Prayer:** Most High God, I take joy in being a member of Your everlasting kingdom, and Your dominion from generation to generation.

November12

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 5
- 2. Theme: Belshazzar's moment of truth
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 5:21
- 4. Statement: Many years have passed. Belshazzar (not "son" in the way we think of it) is now king, and unlike Nebuchadnezzar, has no intention of honoring God. It is significant that even though old Daniel's interpretation is a negative one, Belshazzar still confers the promised rewards on him, so he must have had some honor.
- 5. Response: _____
- 6. **Prayer:** Most High God, You laid it all out from the beginning—Babylon would take Your rebellious people, then fall itself to the Medes and Persians. I am comforted to know that You know everything when I know nothing.

November 13

- 1. Chapter: Daniel 6
- 2. Theme: A trap for Daniel
- 3. Study Verse: Daniel 6:10
- 4. **Statement:** Daniel, old as he is, finds continuing honor and responsibility under the new king—so much so that he rouses jealousy.
